English

Year 5 will be further developing their reading and writing (including grammar, punctuation and spelling) following themes and genres that may be linked to English texts or to our History, Geography and Science topics.

These are main skills taught and revisited this term:

- Making writing interesting using ambitious and specialist vocabulary, varied openers and varied sentence structure.
- Adding meaning using relative clauses, coordinating and subordinating conjunction.
- Writing both formally and informally, using appropriate language and organisational features including paragraphing.
- Correct use of apostrophes, commas in clauses, lists and for parenthesis, and confident, accurate use of capital letters and full stops.

Reading

Students will be both listening to and reading Kensuke's Kingdom by Michael Morpurgo as a springboard for much of our English creative writing and some comprehension tasks. (There is no need to read this at home.)

Students will read daily in class, as a group or individually. Teaching will focus on developing the use of inference to understand the text and providing examples from the text to support clear explanations.

Students should read daily at home for 30 minutes and will have an opportunity to enter the weekly reading raffle. (see separate sheet for full details)

<u>RE</u>

As in previous years, this term, we will continue to follow the Come and See syllabus for RE. We will deepen our understanding of scripture and faith.

Our topic titles for this term are:

- Ourselves. Who am I?
- Life choices. What does commitment really mean?
- Hope. Where do we find hope?

We also will learn from aspects of Judaism, including Passover and the Shema.

Maths

This term we will be focussing on the following topics:

- Place value
- Addition and subtraction
- Multiplication and division
- Fractions

Times Tables Rock Stars

All students are encouraged to used TTRS regularly at home to improve the speed and accuracy of recall of times tables and all aspects of mental maths.

Their password will be stuck into the front of their reading record.

Science

This term, in Science, we will be starting by learning all about 'Forces'. We will be investigating how gravity, air resistance and water resistance effects objects and making conclusions from our observations. After this topic, we will move on to learning all about 'Earth and Space', where we will learning to describe the movement of the planets and the moon.

Computing

We will be using the computer programme 'Purple Mash' to develop our coding skills. We will also be revisiting how to stay safe online this term and throughout the year.

PE

Our class PE day at the field is Monday (all term) and childen should come dressed in their school PE kit. On Wednesdays from 14th September until 19th October inclusive the class will be swimming at Priory and will need come to school dressed in school uniform but bring swimming kit and a towel in a bag.

After half term, PE will continue to be on Mondays, and on Friday afternoons.

As well as swimming, in PE we will be focusing on our ball control skills and how to apply these different skills to a game situation. We will also be considering how to work as a team and what qualities are needed for an effective team.

General

Miss Devlin, Deputy Head, will be class teacher on Wednesdays and on Monday afternoons.

Our day of learning at Sayers Croft will now take place on Monday 26th September.

Revising numbers, greetings, days of the week, month. Saying what time it is. Describing a day. Describing size, colour and features of a character. Food: names, hot or cold.

History

Year 5 will begin learning about 'The struggle for the Kingdom of England AD 410-1066'. In what ways did life in Britain remain the same after the Roman's left?
