THE GOSPEL IN CHURCH Sunday 29th March 2020



There was a friend of Jesus named Lazarus who lived in the village of Bethany with his two sisters, Mary and Martha, and he was very ill. The sisters sent a message to Jesus. But, by the time Jesus had arrived at their home, Lazarus had died.

As soon as Lazarus' sister, Mary, saw Jesus she threw herself at his feet, crying. At the sight of her tears, Jesus said in great distress, with a sigh that came straight from the heart, "Where have you put him?" So they took Jesus to Lazarus' tomb. Jesus wept. "Roll the stone away," he said. Then he cried out in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" Then Lazarus, who had been dead, came out with his feet, hands and face wrapped in strips of burial cloth. Jesus said, "Unbind him: let him go free." Many of the people there saw what Jesus had done and believed in him.

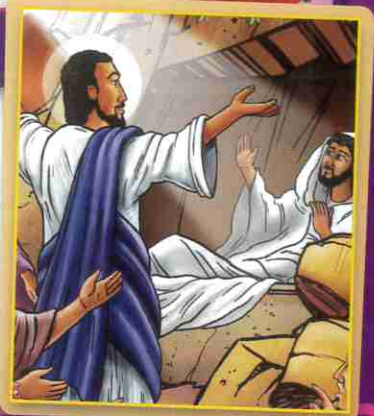


1 Our Special Time Together

3 Loving God & Each Other

"Blessed are the compassionate."

St Chromatius (of Aquileia)

Ask your child what the word 'compassion' means to them. Who is the most compassionate person they know, who really listens when they have a problem? Ask them if they can remember a time when someone showed them care and compassion - what did they do? To be compassionate is to share someone's suffering - to feel sorrow for their situation and to do something about it. It may help your child if you can talk about a person whom you know to be compassionate.

"What we say and how we say it ought to express God's compassion and tenderness for all." Pope Francis

Jesus knew that Martha and Mary were sad and he did what he could to help them. People saw this and started to believe in Jesus. Today we can show people how good Jesus is and help others to believe in him by the way we live. Ask your child if they can remember when they last felt sorry for someone and helped them. As a family, ask yourselves, "Is there anyone who needs our compassion and our help at this time? What could we do?"

Dear Lord Jesus, thank you for the gift of everlasting life. Please help us to be more **compassionate** as we journey through Lent together. Amen.

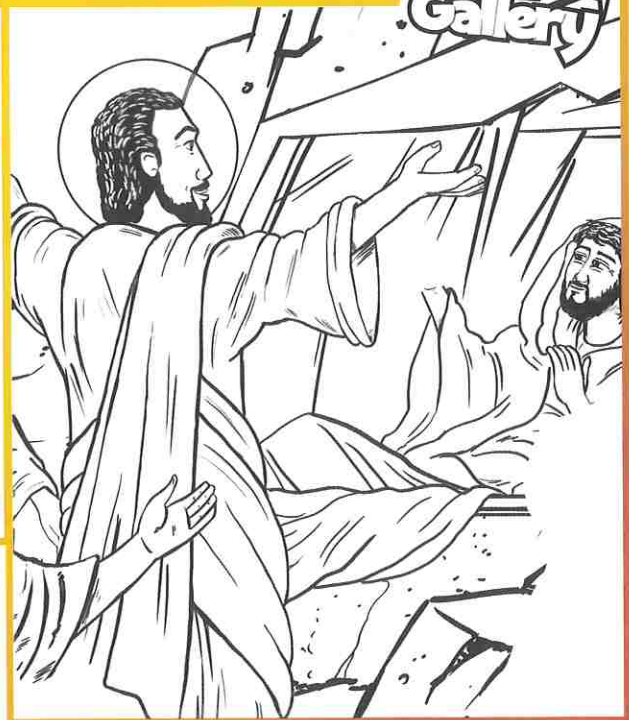
